Activities for Children and Families in 2025

Families with children are always welcome to join in worship at any of our four village churches, but we do have some regular activities which are particularly suitable for younger children.

Each activity is different, and you might be more drawn to one than another, but they compliment each other, so please do think about trying them all. Whatever you decide on, a warm and friendly welcome awaits you. With all the activities, parents, or another adult, must accompany the children, please. Regular activities on offer are as follows:

1st Sunday of the month: Children's Church

4-4.30pm, St Nicolas Church, Forest Hill

Children's Church features a Bible story, followed by a drama of it in 'Acting the Bible' style, songs led by members of the St Nicolas Choir, and prayers. Children and adults all join in acting out the drama, and this short, but structured, service is suitable for even the very youngest children.

2nd Sunday of the month: Crafty Church

4-5pm, Stanton St John Village Hall

Crafty Church follows the same basic format as Children's Church, but includes a related craft activity during which we chat and have drinks and cakes.

4th Sunday of the month: Family Church does Forest Church

3-4pm (winter), 4-5pm (summer), Horton-cum-Studley

Family Church meets in Bernwood Forest as 'Forest Church'. Worship, including a short Bible reading and prayers, is intermingled with outdoor play, woodcraft, conversation, a walk, and an opportunity for appreciation of the natural world. Our relaxed get togethers always end with refreshments of cake and fruit. Attendees can bring their dogs along.

Betty Dye and her team of helpers also run **Children's Craft Workshops**, which take place approximately once a month in Beckley Church, usually on a Friday afternoon from 3.30 - 4.30pm.

Remembrance Sunday

Acts of Remembrance and Remembrance Sunday Services took place on Sunday 10 November around the Four Parishes, as they did in cities, towns and villages up and down the country, and further afield. The individual fallen soldiers from our parishes were each remembered by name, and crosses and wreaths were laid in their memories. I find it striking to hear the long list of names for such small villages — young men lost, never to return home. Thanks to all those who read the names, led the services, played the organ, piano, recorder, trumpet and bugle, and for those who decorated the churches so beautifully, and made sure the churchyards looked their best for the day.

The day was once again rounded off with a concert in Forest Hill, titled 'Far from Home', which featured local musicians, singing, storytelling, poetry reading, and audience participation in singing well know wartime songs. Thank you to all those who made the evening possible.

Advent challenge and beyond

Finishing the 'beyond' challenge from Advent 2023: I hope you are still journeying with me as we start our final leg. For the Old Testament, we need to finish Ezekiel and read the whole of Daniel and the 12 minor prophets: Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah and Malachi. For the New Testament we need to finish 2 Peter and read the whole of John 1, John 2, John 3, Jude and Revelation.

As I have said before, whilst I appreciate this probably sounds rather daunting, it is no harder than any other month we have already conquered. I hope you manage this and feel a sense of achievement at the end. Please do let me know how you get on. If you have got to the end you have done amazingly well, and I hope it has been a fruitful challenge for you.

Advent challenge 2024: 1 December marks the beginning of Advent this

year. As mentioned in the November magazine, I thought for the Advent Challenge I would suggest we read the Gospel of Luke, as it is the Gospel for the coming year, so having it fresh in our minds, especially as we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus, the light of the world, the Word made flesh, Emmanuel, God with us, on Christmas Day, would be an especially good thing. The Gospel of Luke works especially well for this as there are 24 chapters! I look forward to hearing how you get on!

The 'beyond' challenge for Advent 2024: As our 'beyond' part of the challenge this year I thought you might like to join me in reading the New Testament in a year, starting in January. This is a less onerous daily challenge than last year and might give us a bit more time to reflect on the readings, rather than having a feeling of having to rush through them to 'get them done'. There are many different reasons for reading the Bible. Sometimes to simply familiarise ourselves with the various books, sometimes more devotional, etc. I think in this challenge we will have more time to think, reflect and meditate on what we are reading. I hope some of you will join me in this. The important thing remains not to get dispirited if you get a little behind, but to get going again. I hope we can encourage each other. So, in January we will aim to read the Gospel of Matthew up to chapter 22: 22. I look forward to hearing how you get on. Please do let me know.

Looking for the Light: Wednesday 11 December at 7pm: Forest Hill

This service is an opportunity for quiet reflection in the lead up to Christmas. There are four short Bible readings and reflections, a short time of silence between each for us to gather our thoughts, two carols and some short prayers. It is aimed at everyone, but especially for those for whom Christmas might be a difficult time, or those seeking a time for peaceful reflection.

Generally, Christmas is a seen as a season of joy, celebration and happiness. But thinking about my own experiences, and through talking to others over the years, Christmas can be a time of pain and of darkness. Some may be facing Christmas alone as the result of a broken relationship, which Christmas brings to the fore. Some may be facing Christmas for the first time without a loved one who has died in the year, and there is a special person shaped hole which is even bigger than we have previously noticed, and we dread the empty chair at the dinner table. Or we may be facing Christmas for the umpteenth time without a loved one we lost some years ago, or because we have no-one to share Christmas with as usual. So, at this time especially, we are looking for light in the darkness of our situation or our personal pain, or simply enjoying the luxury of a time of quiet amongst the busyness of the season. The service lasts around 35-40 minutes. All are welcome.

To Sleep, Perchance to Dream by Lyn Ebbs

As we head towards the Winter Solstice, some of us look with envy on the animals who deal with winter by sleeping through it, just waking up in the spring. Another option, if you can't face winter, is to relocate to somewhere warmer, maybe with more hours of daylight. When the question is: "Should I stay, or should I go", what drives the decision? If you are a mammal, size matters — if you're big and mobile, migration is relatively easy. As natural

food sources become scarcer with seasonal changes, it's a simple solution for an animal the size of a red deer to migrate down from high ground and, if necessary, take shelter in woodlands. On the other hand, if you are small and territorial, staying put in the place you call home is the better option, and try to conserve energy through the winter.



Though we often call it 'sleep', the brain cycles that hibernating animals go through are very different from sleep patterns — it's more of an extreme slowing down. To use as little energy as possible, their heart rate drops, as does their breathing, a lower body temperature enables them to reduce the amount of energy their body uses, and they enter a state where their metabolism slows down to less than 5% of their normal rate. There is a similar state called 'torpor'; the difference between them being that hibernation appears to be a voluntary state, whereas torpor is usually for shorter time periods and appears to be involuntary.

Hedgehogs are one of the few mammals that are true hibernators, usually



from November through to March. To do this, they need to ensure that they've fattened up enough during summer. While in hibernation their fuel supply comes from these fat stores. They do occasionally awake from hibernation during periods of milder weather to forage for food. They also might not remain in the same

nest all winter; research has shown that individual hedgehogs are likely to move at least once during this period, so they can sometimes be seen out and about. And during mild winters hedgehogs can remain active well into November and December.

Unlike hedgehogs, badgers don't go into hibernation during the winter

in the UK. But they do go into a period called 'winter lethargy', where they slow down so much that they can happily go into a torpid state for days or even weeks during times of harsh weather. Like hedgehogs, badgers build up reserves of fat during the autumn when there is plenty of food to eat. With enough



body fats, badgers are able to go to sleep for weeks at a time. They can also lower their body temperature by a few degrees when they go into torpor. Unlike hedgehogs, they will be in family groups, deep underground in their sett, which provides shelter from rain and cold conditions. Additionally, in the weeks leading up to winter, they have collected insulating bedding materials such as dry grass and fallen leaves.

When it comes to deciding whether to hibernate or migrate, bats seem



able to do both. Most enter hibernation in November and aren't fully active until mid-May. Their winter roosts are mature or veteran trees, hollow from natural decay or that have had cavities bored into them by other species, like woodpeckers. Caves and old mine shafts can also provide good conditions for bats to winter in, if they have a constant temperature

and are free from damp and frost. Pipistrelles are our most common bats, but we don't know where they all go in winter. Not enough hibernation roosts have been found to account for the numbers seen in summer months. However, we know that one species, Nathusius' pipistrelle, undertakes long-distance migration, including sea crossings, and is a winter migrant into Britain from Northern Europe. So it may be that our resident breeding species are not as sedentary as we had assumed.

Helen Weinstein spoke to the school gathering about how Marion took her role as Governor very seriously, and was very honoured that she kept on being asked to continue on for another term as Governor, proud to be useful to her local

Beckley School is proud to have their own bench in memory of Marion Weinstein because as Kate White remarked: "We know that Marion was responsible for fundraising for 4 new benches for Beckley to mark the Millenium, and she realized that the village was such a special place, and that sometimes villagers and visitors just need a seat to sit and think and rest and enjoy the view. My favourite location of these benches is the one just before you reach the Orchard, with wonderful views across the edge of Otmoor. Now we are going to have our own bench to put on the school field by the play equipment, with not only another fantastic view, but to be a special place to foster friendship, so that a child who needs a friend to play with can come to the bench and find someone, which is a very apt way to remember Marion and her wonderful friendship to our school."

As a Governor Marion was remembered for always putting the children's happiness first, caring about their health and welfare. An important memory from a fellow Governor, Katie Kelly: "Marion was a special person. We got to know one another properly when I joined the Governing Body of Beckley Primary School. I did not know what the role would entail but sitting with Marion made everything okay: she was wise, funny, pragmatic and always kind. She saw past the wretched bureaucracy that sometimes threatened to swamp us, and always pushed for what she knew would be best for the school and everyone in it. She volunteered at the school for so many years, and along the way made good things happen for scores of local children and their families. Her warmth, kindness and real community spirit were lovely and we will never forget them. Nor will we forget her fantastic sense of humour, her slightly naughty conspiratorial sense she gave children of sharing a joke with a 'proper' grown-up!".

Dame Elizabeth Holford's Charity News of recent Bursaries

The message below is from Hannah Betts who lives in Beckley.

In May earlier this year the trust very kindly granted me money for new trainers and a running vest. I have used these religiously over the last 6 months and they have been brilliant! I realised I never updated you on how I got on — we finished the marathon in 3 hours 53 minutes! Everyone had warned me running a marathon is "always harder than you think it'll be", and despite knowing this I still found it harder than expected. Nonetheless, I was very proud to have finished it particularly in sub 4 hours.

If you remember, I was running the Edinburgh marathon for charity Clarissa's Campaign [see https://www.gofundme.com/f/clarissas-campaign]. Over the last 8 months or so, along with my friends and Clarissa's family we managed to raise over £55,000, funding almost 8 days of ECG screenings at Cambridge Uni. The first 2 of these days excitingly took place on Tuesday and Wednesday last week where over 200 students were screened. It was covered by the local radio and went really well, and the dates for further screenings in January are currently being finalised.

I have some more running events in the diary, including the recent Cambridge 10k, another charity run in December in London, and the Cambridge half marathon in March. I just wanted to reiterate how grateful I am for your support in allowing me to clock in the miles with some great shoes to prevent me getting injured!

OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL (BECKLEY AND STOWOOD PARISH) (SPEED LIMITS) ORDER 20**

NOTICE is given that Oxfordshire County Council proposes to make the above order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and all other enabling powers. The effect of the order – in order to help improve road safety on local roads – is to introduce a **20mph speed limit** in Beckley, replacing the majority of the existing 30mph speed limit in the process, leading out to the following points:

- 1. Common Road a point 50 metres west of New Inn Road,
- 2. New Inn Road a point 35 metres south of Common Road,
- 3. Otmoor Lane a point 405 metres north of High Street,
- 4. <u>Woodperry Road</u> a point 150 metres northwest of its junction with Woodperry Hill/Horton Road.

The existing 30mph speed limit will remain on that part of New Inn Road between Common Road & the B4027, with Officers having taken the current road environment into account.

The new season of evening talks kicked off in October with an extremely well-received presentation by Rachel Hammond, from EDGE, who spoke about sustainable, edible planting, specifically perennial vegetables, shrubs and trees. Rachel is a Landscape Architect who promotes the planting of vegetables in public settings (such as Florence Park in Oxford).

On 19 November Sue Burge shared her vast knowledge of snowdrops and their folklore connections, alongside educating us about mixed planting.

Our **AGM** at the Millennium Hall on 21 January 2025 will be the traditional mix of 'business', followed by mulled wine, mince pies and a quiz. There will be plants for sale, as at every meeting when members are kind enough to bring along their own produce.

Autumn has taken its time this year, with many trees holding on to their blaze of colour later than usual - a blessing, given the notable lack of sunshine.

This is a good time of year to plant new hedging, with bare root stock available in several local nurseries. I have been thinking about my own garden and trying to decide whether to bite the bullet and buy more expensive but larger specimens in order to see them mature in my lifetime! Another option might be to go for faster growing varieties, trying to strike a balance to ensure a mix of year-round colour, texture and usefulness (e.g thornier evergreens on boundary edges, and perhaps a couple of fruit trees). I'll aim for native planting as much as possible, and varieties offering shelter and food for wildlife.

We're in the process of creating the programme of events for 2025, including a visit to Magdelen College to see the fritillaries in May, as well as a trip to Rousham Park in June. Talks are likely to include something on the Chelsea Flower Show and a speaker from Waterperry House, among other interesting offerings: more details will be confirmed in due course. 
Stanton St John WI
